Greetings to the new Bishop of Jaffna, a Patrician and former Rector of SPC

The Vatican announced on October 13, 2015 that the Very Rev. Msgr. Dr. Justin Bernard Gnanapragasam has been appointed as the new Bishop of the Diocese of Jaffna. Bishop Justin was consecrated at St Mary's Cathedral on November 28, 2015. Thus His Lordship joins an illustrious honour-roll—the 2nd Rector of our Collge to be appointed as the Bishop of Jaffna (following in the footsteps of Bishop Guyomard—Rector 1921 to 1924), the 11th Bishop of Jaffna



and the 11th Patrician to become a Bishop. Bishop Justin was born on May 13, 1948 in Karampon, Kayts, to Antonipillai Gnanapragasam and Emily Thangamalar as the 4th child in the family with three brothers and three sisters. The village Karampon has produced seven sons of the soil as Bishops and many Priests and Nuns thereby earning the nickname "Little Vatican". He had his primary education at St. Anthony's College, Kayts, entered St Martin's minor seminary in 1959 (a contemporary of some of the Melbourne OBA members) and had his secondary education at St Patrick's College, Jaffna. After completing his studies in Philosophy at the National Seminary in Kandy, he studied Theology at the Papal Seminary in Poona, India. He was ordained a Priest of God on April 24, 1974 at Our Lady of Refuge, Jaffna.

The new Bishop of Jaffna is a scholar with a litany of academic qualifications specialising in the field of edu-



cation. He completed a Masters Degree in Ecumenical Theology at the University of Hull, England and then did his doctorate - Ph.D in Education - at the University of Southampton, England. He was the Vice-Rector and later Rector of St. Henry's College, Illavalai, from 1989 to 2002, and then served as the Rector of St. Patrick's College, Jaffna, from 2002 to 2007. In 2007, he was appointed as the Vicar-General of the Jaffna Diocese. During his remarkable period as Rector, many students excelled in studies, entered University, and the

College won several soccer championship trophies. The many academic achievements and appointments of His Lordship include - Visiting lecturer in the Philosophy of Education at the St Francis Xavier Major Seminary, Jaffna (1992 to 2006), Chairman of the Diocesan Commission for Education (1992 to 2002) and Councillor of the University Council, University of Jaffna (1998 to 2014).

His Lordship is a gracious priest of virtue and wisdom and a man of principle and discipline. He is a pastor with a loving heart for the marginalized and the oppressed, and a source of inspiration for many. Many approach him for advice and guidance. Bishop Justin has abundance of abilities and gracefulness to be a shepherd of the Jaffna diocese. He is much recognized and respected by the erudite and Government hierarchy in the north and south. He played an important role during the war years to dispel mistrust and establish peace and harmony in the country. He is an outspoken clergyman who always stood for justice and equality and championed the rights of the people irrespective of their religion or race. Even non-Christians admire his noble qualities and generosity and respectfully accept him as their deliverer in adversity.

Melbourne OBA's association with His Lordship

As old boys of our College, we Patricians are proud of Bishop Justin's appointment as the Sheppard of the Jaffna Catholic Diocese. As Rector of our Alma Mater from 2002 to 2007, His Lordship served as a distinguished forward-thinking educationist and administrator. During his tenure, he set up many income streams the College needed for its continued survival and advancement. He was instrumental in exhorting the Melbourne OBA to establish the SPC Cricket Fund. During his visit to Melbourne in April 2004, he met with the then OBA Management Committee and asked if we could sponsor the College's ongoing cricketing needs.

The request was conveyed to the members, and ad-hock contributions were forthcoming for the next few years. In 2008, the Melbourne OBA's first 'Cricket/BBQ/Family-Day' was held at the Australia Day weekend with the twin goals of 'having fun and raising funds'. Fr Justin, who was visiting Melbourne at the time as Vicar-General of Jaffna, formally launched the 'Jaffna SPC Cricket Sponsorship Fund' at the recreational and heritage grounds of 'Wattle Park', Burwood.



He also donated the trophy for the runner-up of the match which is being played annually at the same grounds on the Australia Day weekend. We also had the pleasure of Fr Justin presenting the trophies again at the cricket/family-day held on Australia Day 2011. To-date we have remitted a total sum of \$10,500 to the College from the Fund.

Members of the Melbourne OBA also have fond memories of participating in the Holy Mass he celebrated at St Paschal's, Box Hill, in 2004 on the occasion of the 30th anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood, and again on his 60th birthday in 2008. **Our prayers are for him always.**

Note: Rev Fr Pathinathan Jebaratnam, also a Patrician—born June 1958 in Alaveddy, has been appointed as the Vicar-General of the Jaffna Diocese.

The College COAT OF ARMS

- 1) Design In the top quarter on the right is an OPEN BOOK with he inscription: "Ite et docete" on a field of gold. Symbolism– The Open Book, with the divine commission to "go and teach" represents Holy Bible, and Faith, which is the foundation of a sound catholic training.
- 2) Design In the bottom quarter on the right are three golden BEES on a field of crimson. Symbolism The bees are clearly suggestive of Labour, which is the vehicle of success in every walk and station of life.
- THE STATE OF THE PARTY OF THE P
- 3) Design In the top quarter on the left is a golden LION, on a field of crimson. Symbolism The lion represents the Government of the country. The Lion was the symbol of the British Crown.
- 4) Design In the bottom quarter on the left is a LOTUS on a field of gold. Symbolism The Lotus represents the dear country of ours whose welfare it is our duty to promote.
- 5) Design In each arm of the inter adjacent cross is a silver SHAMROCK on a field of green. Symbolism The Shamrock represents St. Patrick the Apostle of Ireland and our heavenly Patron whose fostering are and powerful intercession are needed for the realization of our objectives.
- 6) Design In the central shield is the COAT OF ARMS of the congregation of THE OBLATES OF MARY IM-MCULATE on a field of azure which is Mary's own colour. Symbolism The Central Shield represents the Oblates of Mary Immaculate to whom we owe a debt of gratitude for what we are.
- 7) Design Below the main shield, surrounding it is a WREATH consisting of: (i) laurels on the right (ii) shamrocks on the left (iii) a musical instrument in the middle inclining towards the right. Symbolism (i) The Laurels in the Wreath represent the Temporal Rewards, our successes and attainments in this world. (ii) The Shamrocks in the Wreath represent the Eternal Rewards, our heavenly vision of the Triune God. (iii) The Musical Instrument represents the Harmony, and reminds us that every Earthly joy sought after by us should be in perfect accord with our future happiness in Heaven.
- 8) Design Above the main shield is a Scroll on which is written the COLLEGE MOTTO, "Fide et Labore". Symbolism– The College Motto reminds us that Faith is the means by which the Patricians must adhere to the Christian ideals and principles of education, and that Labour is the means by which these principles are put in practice in their daily life.
